Faithful Fivers

Pioneers of AA

Knowing how we got here is an important part of explaining why things are done as they are. Knowing history is also an important way to understand God Shots—why one action today brings benefits for years to come. Below are some points about those who have played a role in the development of A.A.

Sister Ignatia: Sister Ignatia was a member of the Sisters of Charity of St. Augustine. She first began to work with Dr. Bob at St. Thomas hospital in Akron. Dr. Bob wanted to work with an alcoholic and Sister Ignatia 'smuggled' the drunk into the hospital's flower room. St. Thomas would become the first religious hospital in the country to work with alcoholics regularly. While it is said that Dr. Bob worked with over 5,000 drunks between 1935 and 1950, it can be said that Sister Ignatia was his partner in recovery.

During a hospital renovation, a solarium was to be constructed for the alcoholics. Sister Ignatia worked tirelessly to have the solarium named 'Rosary Hall Solarium' - meaning that the abbreviation of the solarium also match Robert Holbrook Smith's initials! Sister Ignatia also had a sense of humor. Clancy I. tells of a time when upon seeing Sister Ignatia he gave her a peck on the cheek. Thinking of what he had done, he asked her 'Is it O.K. to kiss a nun?' She replied, 'Certainly, just don't get into the habit!'

Hank P. of New Jersey: After working with Dr. Bob, Bill D., and others in Akron, Bill W. returned home to New York. Craving intensive work with other alcoholics, he began work with Hank P., who became the first sober New York member. It is said that Hank is referenced on page xxix, he also let Bill and Lois live with him when they lost their home, and worked on the compromise term "God as we understood Him."

According to Ruth Hock, Hank wrote most of the "To Employers" chapter. But friction over with Bill W. arose over several issues with Hank eventually leaving New York. Before leaving, several mentioned that Hank had begun to drink again. His death, at age 57, was, according to Lois W., due to alcohol. While he may not have died sober, his contribution to AA was stupendous.

John D. Rockefeller: While known as one of the richest men in the world at the time, his contribution to AA was to emphasize spirituality over money - "I think money will spoil this." (pg. 111 AA Comes of Age). But Mr. Rockefeller did provide \$5,000 to support A.A, which did help Dr. Bob keep his house and provide a small stipend to Bill and Dr. Bob.

From AA Comes of Age, the reasoning of Mr. Rockefeller was the dangers of money, property, and professionalism. All of which are incorporated into our Traditions. Mr. Rockefeller did host a special dinner for AA at which Bill W. expected millions of dollars of support. Nelson Rockefeller, filling in for his Dad, again stressed the need for poverty. But what the dinner did do was to bring much media attention. The articles about the dinner brought many new members to AA.

AA did take the lessons of John Rockefeller to heart. If you visit the Akron AA Archives during Founder's Week (or any other time) you will see a check whereby Alcoholics Anonymous repaid John Rockefeller the \$5,000 he had provided earlier. According to the archivist, AA is the only group that has ever repaid Rockefeller support.

I Get by with a Little Help from my AA Pamphlet

Ever wonder about all of those pamphlets at the Central Office? Some details are:

Problems Other Than Alcohol (P-35 <u>and</u> F-8) first appeared as a Grapevine article in February 1958 to deal with all of those outside issues. AA has always had a delicate balance between singleness of purpose and dealing with the entire person. There were activities in 1970 for Grapevine reprints of Bill's article "Problems Other Than Alcohol." In 1974 there were efforts to publish Bill's article in a standard pamphlet format and in 1979 the recommendation to do so. Finally, in 1982, the small except pamphlet was approved. If you look at the pamphlet rack at the Central Office of your Group you will notice that Problems Other Than Alcohol is the only pamphlet with two versions! AA is often

District Committees—Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community (PI/CPC)

If you are enthusiastic about your recovery and want to share the good news with others—we have a great opportunity for you! The Public Information and the Cooperation with Professionals committees both have the same purpose—AA's primary purpose—to spread the message of AA to the alcoholic who still suffers. The Public Information committee carries the message through the use of the media and public speakers. It ensures that any information the public receives is correct and is given within the guidelines of The Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous.

There are many possible projects this committee could carry out. We could encourage greater use of AA Public Services Announcements (PSA) in our area. We could distribute AA meeting schedules to hotels during Master's Week. We could staff a booth at local health fairs or recovery events. In the past, our District purchased Big Books and distributed them in libraries through the CSRA.

Members of the Cooperation with Professionals committee provide information about A.A. to people who have contact with alcoholics through their profession. This group includes health care professionals, educators, clergy, lawyers, social workers, union leaders, and industrial managers, as well as those working in the field of alcoholism. Information is provided about where we are, what we are, what we can do, and what we cannot do. Some examples of projects include contacting physicians to inquire about placing literature about AA in waiting rooms, speaking at DUI schools, or contacting local drug courts to provide information.

I am trying to revive the PI/CPC committee in our District and the biggest discovery I've made to date is that I can't do this alone! I'm looking for additional members to help spread the hope of AA through the PI/CPC committee. Please join us for our committee meeting, held the fourth Wednesday each month at 6:30 pm in the Central Office. The Steps of AA

Long-timers will tell you that the answers to living in the now are found in the Big Book. One story goes that a Sponsee went to his Sponsor with a problem. The Sponsor told him it was in the Big Book. "Where?" asked the Spondee. "Start reading from the front until you find it" was the response. There is a cheat sheet used by the Hopeful Hearts Group at the Whitworth Women's Facility that is used to hone into the essence of each Step during a crisis or tough day.

Step Four Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.

Therefore, we started upon a personal inventory. This was Step Four. A business which takes no regular inventory usually goes broke. Taking a commercial inventory is a fact-finding and a fact-facing process. It is an effort to discover the truth about the stock-in-trade. One object is to disclose damaged or unsalable goods, to get rid of them promptly and without regret. If the owner of the business is to be successful, he cannot fool himself about values. (pg. 64)

We did exactly the same thing with our lives. We took stock honestly. First, we searched out the flaws in our make-up which caused our failure. Being convinced that self, manifested in various ways, was what had defeated us, we considered its common manifestations. (pg. 64)

It must be noted that an honest inventory does look at all items - good and bad. But it is the bad items that get us into trouble. There is a story of an electronics store that was in financial trouble. It had an expert conduct an inventory. The expert said "All your items are Beta-Maxes, 8-track tapes, rotary telephones, etc. This is junk!" The owner replied "But everything is in a fancy box!" A lot of times character traits we think are good or useful are actually the opposite.

Step Five Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.

When we decide who is to hear our story, we waste no time. We have a written inventory and we are prepared for a long talk. We explain to our partner what we are about to do and why we have to do it. (pg. 75)

We pocket our pride and go to it, illuminating every twist of character, every dark cranny of the past. (pg. 75)

After finishing my Fourth Step, my Sponsor and I did Step 5. The exact nature of my wrongs were inflated ego, fear, and anger/rage/white-hot hate. I had done many things (the branches) but my particular plant had only three roots.

Step Six Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

Are we now ready to let God remove from us all the things which we have admitted are objectionable? (pg. 76)

Step 6 was easy for me. Was I entirely ready to have God remove my inflated ego, my fear, and

my hate? You bet! Because I had seen serene people in AA meetings.

AA History

While Smithy Smith drove his father and mother to their meeting with Bill Wilson, daughter Sue stayed at home. Sue did notice that her father "looked better all around." (Dr. Bob, pg. 69)

Just after getting sober, Dr. Bob and Bill W. began to work with Eddie R. Eddie and his wife were brought into the Smith home (and took Sue Windows room). Eddie proceeded to escape the house by sliding down the drain spout, beat his wife, and chased Anne Smith around the house with a knife. This resulted in Eddie leaving. He showed up years later at Dr. Bob's funeral with a year of sobriety.

Early alcohol detox treatments by Bill W. and Dr. Bob were sauerkraut, tomato juice and Karo Syrup.

The Waynesboro Group began through the efforts by a visitor from Florida (Lynn S.) and a Counselor from the Ogeechee Clinic (Buddy C.).

Louis M. of Augusta was the Georgia Delegate (1958-1959). Samuel H.S. of the Forest Hills Group was the Georgia Delegate (1990-1991).

"Experience, Strength, and Hope" contains personal stories that are no longer in the Big Book. "Experience, Strength and Hope" was published in April 2003. This book is a great resource to see how personal stories have changed over the years—and how much they have stayed the same.

"Living Sober" was first published in 1975. (Editor's Note: When trying to get sober on my own, I bought all the books that were at the Central Office, including "Living Sober." I started reading it first because it was so thin and I wanted to live sober. When my wife would fall asleep on the couch, I would go make myself a drink and continue to read "Living Sober.")

In 1961, Bill W. writes to Carl Jung about the importance of Rowland H. to AA and the foundation that Carl Jung helped to lay through his treatment of Rowland. Jung responded and confirmed that spirituality is the most appropriate treatment of alcoholism. The Poetry and Literature Section Because, as we find on page xxx "They are often able, intelligent, friendly people." (Editors note: I am, but humility keeps me from bragging about it.)

I Am a Pickle

I am a little Pickle I didn't start this way. I started as a cucumber But then I drank one day. It tasted kind of funny But made me feel so good. I soon found that I was drinking A bit more than I should. One day my eyes were blurry And I began to sway. For I had become a Pickle How did I get this way? Let me be that cucumber I was back in the day. There's no going back A Pickle I will stay.

Hokey, perhaps. "But we aren't a glum lot. If newcomers could see no joy or fun in our existence, they wouldn't want it." pg. 132. In the CSRA we do have the 'Pickle Chip' as a measure of our sobriety. I never knew it took nine months to make a pickle! :-)

Early in sobriety I heard Song # 1 and had a spiritual experience. The song does address the fact that anyone in AA, no matter how many days sober, can carry the message. As we truly understand each other as alcoholics, we do not need to have anything else in common.

Tradition Four

Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole. * Do I insist that there are only a few right ways of doing things in AA?

- * Does my group always consider the welfare of the rest of AA? Of nearby groups? Of loners in Alaska? Of internationalists miles from port? Of a group in Rome or El Salvador?
- * Do I put down other members' behavior when it is different from mine, or do I learn from it?
- * Do I always bear in mind that, to those outsiders who know I am in AA, I may to some extent represent our entire beloved Fellowship?
- * Am I willing to help a newcomer go to any lengths his lengths, not mine to stay sober?
- * Do I share my knowledge of AA tools with other members who may not have heard of them?

Tradition Five

Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

- * Do I ever cop out by saying, "I'm not a group, so this or that Tradition doesn't apply to me"?
- * Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the limitations of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
- *Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
- * Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to who or what is in it for me?
- * Do I help my group in every way I can to fulfill our primary purpose?
- * Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?

Tradition Six

An AA group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

- * Should my fellow group members and I go out and raise money to endow several AA beds in our local hospital?
- * Is it good for a group to lease a small building?
- * Are all the officers and members of our local club for AAs familiar with "Guidelines on Clubs" (which is available free from GSO)?
- * Should the secretary of our group serve on the mayor's advisory committee on alcoholism?
- * Some alcoholics will stay around AA only if we have a TV and card room. If this is what is required to carry the message to them, should we have these facilities?
