Important Dates in A.A. History

(Details from http://www.a-lassociates.com/aa/HISTORY_PAGE/dates.htm and was collected & assembled by Nancy O. of Virginia. This is a Maryland AA History site.)

January 4, 1941: Bill and Lois Wilson drove to Bedford Hills, NY, to see Stepping Stones and broke in through an unlocked window.

January 8, 1938: New York A.A. split from the Oxford Group.

January 10, 1940: 1st AA meeting not in a home meets at King School, Akron, Ohio.

January 23, 1961: Bill W. sent an appreciation letter, which he considered long-overdue, to Dr. Carl Jung for his contribution to A.A.

January 30, 1961: Dr. Carl Jung answers Bill's letter with "Spiritus Contra Spiritum."

January 1938: Jim Burwell, author of "The Vicious Cycle," a former atheist, gave A.A. "God as we understand Him."

February 12, 1945: World War II paper shortage forced reduction in size of the Big Book.

February 18, 1943: AA's were granted the right to use cars for 12th step work in emergency cases, despite gas rationing.

February 22, 1842: Abe Lincoln addressed the Washington Temperance Society in Springfield, IL.

February 23, 1959: AA granted "Recording for the Blind" permission to tape the Big Book.

February 1908: Bill Wilson made boomerang.

March 1, 1941: Saturday Evening Post article by Jack Alexander created national sensation. AA membership quadrupled in one year from 2000 to 8000.

1941: Sybil C.'s sobriety date. She was the first woman to enter AA west of the Mississippi.

March, 1938: Bill begins writing the book Alcoholics Anonymous. Works Publishing Inc established to support writing and printing of the book.

March 1941: 1st Prison AA Group formed at San Quentin.

March 1946: The Jefferson Barracks AA Group in Missouri was formed. It is thought to be the first ever in a military installation.

A.A. Biography

The Home of Bob and Anne Smith Akron, Ohio

Much of the success of early Alcoholics Anonymous took place at the home of Bob and Anne Smith. This house was the location of Dr. Bob's alcoholic suffering (as well as his family's), the early time Bill and Bob had together, and Dr. Bob's service work until his death.

The home is located at 855 Ardmore Ave, Akron, Ohio. It is a small arts and crafts house. It was built in 1915 with the newlywed couple moving in in 1916 after their 15 year courtship. They lived there together for the next 34 years. This home saw the youthful years of the two children of Bob and Anne. It also saw many drunks living there, the first being Bill Wilson. It is the home where Anne received the telephone call that set the stage for Bill and Dr. Bob to meet in the Seiberling Gatehouse.

It is said that Smitty Smith would often sleep on the back porch roof when a recovering alcoholic was in his room. Often Dr. Bob would conduct 12th-step visits in the room, including the 3rd Step Prayer. It is also here where Anne was chased through the house by a violent drunk with a knife. The house has been restored to its original status, including furniture. It is open for tours and is extremely popular during Founders Day. If you visit, please note the 12 steps leading up to the house from the sidewalk.

Available at Dr. Bob's House is "House Full of Miracles." This is a short documentary of the history of A.A. Of interest is that it was produced by former Georgia Delegate Dick A.

The next Founders Day is June 9-11, 2023. Registration begins on March 1, 2023.

Staying Connected

For a group of drunks who are not organized, we certainly do have a lot of things going on. There is service work and educational activities going on all of the time. These range from activities in your Home Group and going all the way to the A.A. International Convention. Some options for you are:

Home Group: Your home Group has many options for recovery. All Groups have meetings. Some Groups host special events such as alcathons – which is a day-long event dedicated to something like New Year's Eve.

Districts 12A & 12B: Our District has many ways to stay connected. This Sober Daze newsletter is one option. There are several Central Office service committees: Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community (PI/CPC), Treatment Facilities, Archives, Grapevine, Sober Daze, Special Needs, and Correctional Facilities.

Area 16 – Georgia: For statewide activities, the Central Office in Macon is the coordinating office. The Georgia State Service Assembly meets three times a year. There are several service committees – the Grapevine Committee, the Communications Committee, the Archives Committee, the PI/CPC Committee, the Corrections Committee, and the Treatment/Special Needs Committee. Finally, The Georgia Message of A.A. is the state newsletter.

Other A.A. Areas: The primary way to stay connected is to subscribe to or visit the newsletters of difference Areas or Central Offices. The Sober Daze Editor can be contacted for information.

AA General Service Organization: The national office is located in New York. There are many different newsletters available and complement the large number of A.A. publications. Also, support staff for various committee work are available as resources. Affiliated with the A.A. office is The A.A. Grapevine. An English and a Spanish version of this publication are available.

AA International Conference: The A.A. International Conference is held every five years. Vancouver will welcome A.A. members from around the world for the 2025 International Convention. This will mark the 90th anniversary of the beginning of our Fellowship's founding. The International Convention will take place from July 3 - 6, 2025, at the Vancouver Convention Centre and BC Place Stadium.

Recover versus Recovery versus Recovered

The longer I am from my last drink, the more I find myself studying the Big Book. My latest research has been into three words used in the Big Book: recover, recovery, and recovered.

Recovered is the fifteenth word of the Forward to the First Edition. This word is followed by additional references mixed in with recovery and recovered.

While a 1938 dictionary would be the best source, the latest Merriam Webster dictionary from the internet is used. This source tells us:

Recover: to get back, regain; to bring back to normal position or condition; to make up for, to find or identify again

Recovery: the act, process, or an instance of recovering; the process of combating a disorder (such as alcoholism) or a real or perceived problem

Recovered: as the past tense of recover, it has the same definitions

Speaking with Old-Timers, the point is made that we are returned to sanity. Again, a past-tense word. Being returned, it would appear that we have gotten back our sanity, regained our sanity, or brought back to a normal condition.

So, we go through the process of recovery to recover and, if we follow the process, stay recovered / sane.

I am reminded of an old story. A man walks into a bar and proceeds to get drunk. Once there, he sees a beautiful woman at the end of the bar and thinks, "She wants me." He walks down to her and proceeds to annoy her. Then, her boyfriend walks up and tells the drunk to leave. The drunk refuses and wants to fight. They go outside and the boyfriend proceeds to pound the drunk, breaking several bones. Finally, he turns the drunk over and says "From now on, when you sit down you'll remember not to annoy women" and proceeds to shot the drunk in both buttocks.

The drunk is eventually taken to the hospital and recovers. He leaves the hospital a recovered gunshot victim.

But if he returns to the bar

- 1. We have absolutely no idea where our purse is.


Special Needs
