
The Mission of the Akron AA Archives- To preserve the A.A. message and carry it to other alcoholics.

The following comment/pages are taken from the long-forgotten book that was quite popular with the creation of the book Alcoholics Anonymous, which was first printed in April 1939.


Stools and Bottles



Some years ago, the author of The Little Red Book worked out a novel presentation and published it in the form of a book in 1955. The content was an example of the first four steps of the A.A. program. Visual aids, consisting of a three-legged stool and eight empty whiskey bottles, were used to portray the intangible factors of these fundamental steps. The book provides thirty-one daily reminders.

They deal with A.A. problems commonly encountered by alcoholics who try to make A.A. their way of life. (the following are EXAMPLES of the guidance in this book)

RESENTMENT

Resentment is like a double-edged sword. It cuts two ways, injuring us more than it wounds another. Alcoholies know that it harms them more for it leads them back to drinking.

A.A. states that resentment is the "number one offender" among our members, that it puts more alcoholics in their graves than any other thing.

Its subtle action is cunningly contrived to deceive us regarding the danger of its use. Resentful members may be physically sober but very drunk mentally. (Spiritual illness.)

Resentment makes slaves of us all, binding us with mental chains to the thing we hate. We find our release in prayer. We cannot hate and pray for anything at the same time.

ANGER

Anger is a strong emotion of displeasure which excites us to acts of antagonism, fury, rage and violence.

It is a human impulse loaded with mental and physical energy. But, since we have to live with it, we must learn how to divert it to constructive use. Most of the time we must kill it entirely; otherwise it may kill us.

Anger, in a broad sense, indicates a decided loss of self-control. Fury and wrath imply an overmastering passion verging on madness with an intent of revenge and punishment.

The 12 Steps are a spiritual way of life which directly opposes anger in all its phases. They are a means by which we learn to control its harmful influence. We inventory our anger.

ANGER

A specific emotion aimed toward injury to others. Its end is to kill or destroy. Primitive man used it as a means of survival. A.A. suggests no instance where it benefits our members. On the contrary, we are warned to avoid it.

Anger opposes all 12 Step principles. It overrides reason. It insulates us from God and the spiritual help necessary for our recovery.

SELF-PITY

Pity is a feeling for the suffering of others. Self-pity is a gross misuse of this worthy feeling. It is an extreme form of self-centeredness which retards our spiritual growth. There are many reasons for self-pity and they are all bad.

Members who are daily addicts to this insidious mental poison lead unhappy lives and stand little chance for success in A.A. or elsewhere. To be filled with commiseration, compassion and sympathy for ourselves is an inferior feeling born of emotional instability. It stiffes 'A.A. growth.

Self-pity is the brother of resentment. It is childish rebellion against God, people and circumstances. Appreciation is the antidote for its poison.

Don't underrate this mild mental beverage. It is slow acting, but it carries a knockout wallop.

Self-pity — the magic drink — helps you make mountains out of mole hills. Stay tight on this stuff, and you will become an A.A. weakling.

It magnifies your problems. It absorbs you with calamity's details until you cannot see the helpful opportunities about you.

Self-pity is rebellion in disguise — a rebellion against circumstances and against God's Will. Kill it with appreciation and faith.
